

MAINE RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS FOR PERSONS FORCED TO REGISTER

DESCRIPTION & DISCLAIMER: This spreadsheet was created as a reference for municipalities in the state of Maine known to have residency restriction ordinances. This report is limited to ordinances found through internet searches & may not cover every community within the state of Maine. Ordinances can pass at any time & with little to no media coverage; thus, I implore you to review the latest municipal ordinance or contact law enforcement in the community if you are using this report as part of your hunt for a home. We at OnceFallen.com use terms like Registered Person (RP) and Person Forced to Register (PFR) rather than “registered sex offender” (RSO) because the term is often misused in society & implies everyone on the registry is a “pedophile”, another misused term that implies someone given that label is destined to reoffend, primarily or exclusively against children. However, state and local officials and legislation often use the term “sex offender” and thus is published in this report when in the official document.

SUMMARY: While the state of Maine does not have statewide residency restriction laws, the state passed legislation in 2009 that allows municipalities to make ordinances restricting RPs (up to 750 feet) with offenses against anyone under age 14, & can be a condition of probation/parole. Unlike most other states that allow municipal/ local governments to pass ordinances dictate where persons forced to register on the sex offense registry can reside, Maine places limitations of 750 feet, and limits the ordinances to (1) A public or private elementary, middle or secondary school; (2) A municipally owned or state-owned park, athletic field or recreational facility that is open to the public where children are the primary users; or (3) A municipally owned or state-owned property leased to a nonprofit organization for purposes of a park, athletic field or recreational facility that is open to the public where children are the primary users. MRS §30-A-3014 (full law posted on next page). Past attempts to both expand the ordinances to 2500 feet¹ and to eliminate residency restrictions altogether² was attempted but it failed in legislature.

Maine is divided into 16 counties and contains 482 municipalities consisting of 23 cities, 430 towns (similar to Midwestern “townships”), and 29 plantations as of 2023. In Maine, a plantation is an organized form of municipal self-government similar to but with less power than a town or a city. One difference is that plantations cannot make local ordinances. That still leaves 453 municipalities that can create ordinances. It does not seem like counties are granted the authority to pass statewide restrictions.

New laws can pass at any time; oftentimes, they may be passed as a response to a Registered Person moving into the community. For example, the town of Orrington passed a local ordinance after a Registered Person moved into the community. (The news report showed a citizen-created flier outing a resident as a Level 3 “SO” with an invitation to “Google him”). Two petitions were created by citizens but after a Dec. 2023 vote, the local voters voted for a version of the ordinance written by the town attorney by a 91-23 margin.³

MAINE'S MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE LAW AUTHORIZING RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS

Title 30-A: MUNICIPALITIES & COUNTIES, Part 2: MUNICIPALITIES, Subpart 4: ORDINANCE AUTHORITY & LIMITATIONS

Chapter 141: ORDINANCES, §3014. Ordinances regarding residency restrictions for sex offenders (REALLOCATED FROM TITLE 30-A, SECTION 3013) or MRS §30-A-3014 for short

1. Application & scope. The State intends to occupy & preempt the entire field of legislation concerning the regulation of persons convicted of a sex offense in this State or in another jurisdiction. Except as provided in this section, a municipality may not adopt or enforce any ordinance or bylaw addressing persons who have been convicted of a sex offense in this State or in another jurisdiction that would impose on them restrictions or requirements not imposed on other persons who have not been convicted of a sex offense in this State or in another jurisdiction. As used in this section, "convicted of a sex offense in this State or in another jurisdiction" means a conviction for any current or former Maine crime listed in former Title 17, sections 2922 to 2924 or Title 17-A, chapter 11 or 12 or Title 17-A, section 556; a conviction for an attempt or solicitation of those listed crimes; or any conviction for any former or current crime in any other jurisdiction in which the person engaged in substantially similar conduct to that of the earlier specified current or former Maine crimes. [RR 2009, c. 1, §21 (RAL).]

2. Residency restriction ordinance. A municipality may adopt an ordinance regarding residency restrictions for persons convicted of Class A, B or C sex offenses committed against persons who had not attained 14 years of age at the time of the offense. Any such ordinance is limited as follows:

A. An ordinance may restrict only residence. It may not impose additional restrictions or requirements, including, but not limited to, registration & fees. [RR 2009, c. 1, §21 (RAL).]

B. A municipality may prohibit residence by a sex offender up to a maximum distance of 750 feet surrounding the real property comprising:

(1) A public or private elementary, middle or secondary school;

(2) A municipally owned or state-owned park, athletic field or recreational facility that is open to the public where children are the primary users; or

(3) A municipally owned or state-owned property leased to a nonprofit organization for purposes of a park, athletic field or recreational facility that is open to the public where children are the primary users. [PL 2017, c. 393, §1 (RPR).]

C. An ordinance may not restrict the residence of a person who lived in an area restricted pursuant to paragraph B prior to the adoption or amendment of the ordinance. [RR 2009, c. 1, §21 (RAL).]

D. An ordinance may not be premised on a person's obligation to register pursuant to Title 34-A, chapter 15. [RR 2009, c. 1, §21 (RAL).]

CONDUCTING YOUR OWN RESEARCH

To find a municipal code online, type “[name of community] Maine Municipal Code” or [name of community] Maine Sex Offender Ordinance.” I prefer the former because not all ordinances impacting Registered Persons will be conveniently labeled “sex offender ordinance”, and that some PDF files of municipal ordinances may not be readable because they’re older scanned copies of scanned pages from a paper document or book.

Many municipalities do indeed post ordinances online. Most ordinances follow a specific template. Some Maine communities also post ordinances on websites like Municode (<https://library.municode.com/>), American Legal Publishing Corporation (<https://codelibrary.amlegal.com/>) and General Code/eCode360 (<https://ecode360.com/> or <https://www.generalcode.com/>). On these sites, you may use the search function and type in the word “sex offender”, “sex” “offense” “sexual” “school” or even “feet” to try to locate an ordinance. If a search function is not an option, most sex offense ordinances will be found under parts of the code like “Offenses” or “Public Safety” or “Zoning”.

Many municipalities have their own websites and many post ordinances on their website. Based on the results of this report, many municipal ordinances in smaller communities may indeed label their local ordinances as a “sex offender (residency) ordinance” but they may otherwise appear in parts of other codes related to public safety, miscellaneous offenses, nuisances, or zoning ordinances. (Note: In Maine, municipalities often use the term “Safe Zone” as zones that enhance penalties for drug offenses rather than as a description for areas covered by a residency restriction ordinance; other state like Texas use similar zones to describe residency restriction zones, so I don’t use that term in this report unless the municipality clearly uses that term.))

Ordinances tend to borrow from each other and read similarly to one another. Virtually all begin with the dubious claim that Persons Forced to Register have high re-offense rates and/or these laws are not intended to be punitive/punishment. The vast majority of existing ordinances will follow the existing state law previous listed and/or cite Title 30-A MRS §3001, which grants municipalities the power to enact their own rules so long as it is not in conflict with state laws.

It is still important for you to read the ordinance. A handful of communities have passed local ordinances that exceed the limitations placed on such local restrictions by the previously mentioned state statute. For example, the town of Corinth’s residency increases residency restrictions from 750 feet to 3000 feet as well as increasing the age range from those with offenses against minors under the age of 14 to offenses against those under the age of 16; it also includes presence restrictions that cover a multitude of places that may not even exist, like video arcades or offices for Child Protective Services. (It appears they patterned the town ordinance from a template created for use in the state of Texas.) Laws that exceed state law should be unenforceable; however, local officials may not be educated in the law and may try enforcing a bad law against you.

Since 750 feet is marked from the shortest distance between two property lines, you need access to a plat map to know if your property is beyond 750 feet of a prohibited area. However, many communities have a map or list of prohibited residency at the local municipal building or police station.

DO NOT rely on AI results. I have often seen AI claim no ordinance exists when it is listed in the search results right under the AI description.

HOW TO READ THIS REPORT

Municipalities with local restrictions will be listed first, followed by communities without restrictions, and ending with a list of communities that do not post their ordinances online. The lists for municipalities, and later for those without ordinances, will be listed only by name of municipality, type, county, and population. The categories in the spreadsheet are as follow for municipalities with restrictions:

- **Municipality:** Name of municipality
- **Co.:** The county where the municipality is located
- **Pop.:** The population of the municipality
- **Passed:** The date the ordinance originally passed; changes to the laws may have been made since then
- **Ord.:** The name of the initial ordinance
- **Code:** Where you may find the most current copy of the ordinance
- **GFC:** “Grandfather Clause.” In ALL of the ordinances, a person can’t be forced to move if a person resided in that location before the original ordinance passed. HOWEVER, for this report, this section specifically covers whether or not this grandfather clause includes of a prohibited area is created after you have already resided in a location. If YES, you won’t have to move if your home becomes part of a prohibited zone after you’ve in; if NO, then you may be forced to move if your home is placed within a prohibited zone after you moved in.

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- **SETBACKS:** Some municipal ordinances use the term “Setback”, a term generally used in Maine law to denote a minimum distance requirement for shoreline buildings, to describe the 750-foot restriction from prohibited areas.
- **MUNICIPAL ORD DEFINITIONS CAN BE VAGUE:** Some municipalities may add a number of areas that they may consider a “park” or “recreation area.” Restricted Properties in Georgetown, for example, “includes, without limitation, the following properties...The Georgetown Central School; The Georgetown Community Center; The Richards Library; The Town Wharf, boat launches, trails and preserves; The Town Tennis Court; and any licensed and registered daycare facilities.
- **ORDINANCES EXCEEDING TATE LIMITS:** While the state places a strict limitation on the state law, a handful of municipal ordinances exceed the limitations (and thus violating state law) by adding additional distances to residency restrictions or anti-loitering laws. The following municipalities have restrictions that do NOT follow the state guidelines and are likely unenforceable to the extent that it exceeds state law or adds a provision not granted by state law:
 - Has residency restriction distances exceeding state law limits:
 - Adds Proximity or Anti-Loitering laws:
 - Applies Residency Restrictions to those with offenses against those over the age of 14:
 - Other additional restrictions: These may include employment/ business license bans
- **RRs:** At times, this report uses RR as shorthand for residency restriction laws. So SORR would mean “S*x Offender Residency Restrictions.”

PLANTATIONS IN MAINE

The term “plantation” as a government designation is unique to Maine. A plantation in Maine is not a town or village, nor is it an “unorganized territory.” A Maine plantation is self-governing and provides most of the same services as a town, but unlike a town, does not have the power to make ordinances. Because plantations lack the ability to create their own ordinances, it is assumed plantations don’t have the power to pass residency restriction ordinances at this time. Still, we are placing info about them here in case Maine’s law changes in the future and allows plantations to have such restrictions.

There are 29 plantations in Maine.
